For 26 years, Charlie Fish has been a passionate advocate for the power of the short story, as founder and editor of the internet's longest-running short stories website "Fiction on the Web". Now, for the first time, he has published a collection of his own short stories.

Stories in this illustrated collection include:

- Death by Scrabble a disillusioned man expresses his rage through the medium of Scrabble. This story has been published in school textbooks worldwide, and adapted many times into short films and plays.
- The Man Who Married Himself a laugh-out-loud comedy with heart, about an unusual union. This story was adapted into a film starring Richard E Grant and Emilia Fox, that won Best Comedy at LA Shorts Fest and Rhode Island International Film Festival.
- Baggio's Story a subversive comedy about a man determined to give up everything he owns, including his free will. This story was adapted as "The Philosopher", an award-winning film starring Jean Reno.
- And 14 more stories. Previous publication credits include British Library Tales of the Weird, The Mechanics' Institute Review, East of the Web, Sci Phi Journal and The Best of Dark Moon Digest.

The Man Who Married Himself includes illustrations by Yvette Gilbert, an artist from Staffordshire, UK, working with traditional dip pen and ink on watercolour paper.

Synopsis:

The 17 stories in The Man Who Married Himself alternate between funny and serious. Half the stories are full-on comedies, and the rest include mystery, horror, romance, crime, historical fiction and science fiction.

The book also includes resources for teachers to help make the most of Death by Scrabble in a classroom context.
